

On Scientists & Inventors Day, our students arrived in costume and spent the day studying famous African American scientists and creating projects and experiments inspired by their important work.

African American History Month at BWS is a vibrant celebration of culture and innovation.



A 5th grader dressed as Augustus Jackson, a Black chef who is widely considered the "Father of Ice Cream." Jackson's innovative manufacturing and flavoring methods in the 1830s laid the foundation for modern ice cream production. < On African Attire Day, students proudly showcased their African heritage by wearing traditional clothing.





A Salsa dance performance by Mr. O's 5th grade class with Dr. Arrington illustrated the rich cultural history of the African Diaspora. Salsa has deep African roots, incorporating call-and-response, rhythms, and movements that are all based on African musical traditions.

ACADEMIC GROWTH AND MAP* TESTING



Over **90%** of Kindergarten and 5th graders met their goals in MATH.

BWS celebrates all forms of growth, and this year's MAP test results show that students made significant progress across core subjects, often exceeding expectations. While we celebrate these strong results, we maintain our focus on continued growth.

This year, we are strengthening reading support for 4th and 5th graders, expanding language arts instruction, and providing small group support. We look forward to gauging the success of these efforts with the next year's MAP test.

Students made meaningful strides in reading, with notable gains in Kindergarten, 1st, and 3rd grades. Our students aren't just keeping up—they're moving ahead at a pace that reflects their hard work and our commitment to academic excellence. MAP, or Measures of Academic Progress, is a computer assessment tool used to measure student achievement and growth against national and state standards.
